Finance Committee Business

1. Call to Order; Roll Call

- Finance Committee member Scott Hansen called the meeting to order at 6:32 p.m.
- Introductions of the committee members.

2. Approval of Meeting Minutes

• Cyril Yu moved with Brian Daucher seconding approval of the December 14, 2015 meeting minutes, as presented.

3. 2014-15 Audit Presentation

- Presented by Rick Alonzo of Vavrinek, Trine, Day & Co. LLP
- Focus on the general fund of the district
- Page 91 Summary of Auditor's Results
 - Auditor's opinion
 - Unmodified opinion is the cleanest audit a district can receive
 - No audit adjustments were proposed
 - o Federal Awards
 - All Federal compliance requirements met
 - State Awards
 - One State compliance finding
 - Name of Program: Unduplicated Local Control Funding Formula Pupil Counts
 - CALPADS report was not updated to reflect the total number of free and reduced lunch applications
- GASB 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions
 - o Reporting of PERS and STRS created a significant change from years past
 - o Incorporated in the District's financial audit for the first time
 - o Impacts district's liability for the unfunded portion
- Audit contains both full accrual and modified accrual financial statements
- District and sites were well prepared for the auditors; overall the audit went very well.

4. Overview of Governor's Budget Proposal

- Presented by John Fogarty, Assistant Superintendent of Business Services
- 2016-17 marks the fourth straight year of significant increases
 - o Restoration of cuts in previous years to be fully funded by the year 2020-21
- Governor's Budget Proposal is weighted heavily on LCFF
 - o LCFF was implemented prior to the restoration of funds
 - o \$2.8 billion allocated to further eliminate LCFF Gap

- \$14.3 million for IUSD
 - \$3.1 million in ongoing expenditure increases
 - \$11.2 million available funds
- o \$1.1 billion in one-time discretionary funds
 - \$6.7 million for IUSD (\$214 per ADA)
- o Increases will begin to diminish from year to year as we close the gap
- Friedrichs v. California Teachers Association
 - School Districts could be affected by the outcome of this case as unions lobby for education at the state level.
- IUSD has historically been low-funded prior to LCFF
 - o Unique base revenue limit
 - Irvine was a very rural area at the time the district started
- One-time funds may change again with the May revise.
- \$6.7 million will be discussed through the LCAP.

5. Update on School Facilities Improvement District (SFID)

- Presented by John Fogarty, Assistant Superintendent of Business Services
- Resolution of Intent to Form SFID was approved by the board on January 26, 2016
 - o First step in the formation of the SFID
- Entire Resolution of Intent will print in The Irvine World News on February 4 and 11
 - o This is notification to the public that there will be a public hearing on March 1
- Currently drafting communication for HOAs within the SFID boundaries
- Finance Committee members welcome and encouraged to come speak at the March 1 board meeting
- Proposed SFID boundaries do not include all communities within IUSD boundaries
 - o CFD 86-1 (Included in SFID)
 - Very large area; set up to build several schools
 - Due to expire in 2020
 - Lighter mello-roos taxes than other CFDs
 - o CFD 01-1, CFD 04-1, CFD 06-1 (Not included in SFID)
 - These communities are already paying a much higher mello-roos, schools are newer
 - o CFD 09-1 (Not included in SFID)
 - Includes funding for schools as well as set up to have additional funding for maintenance of the schools.
- If we bond at \$29 it will generate \$251 million. Other funding will enable us to increase that amount up to \$315 million
 - o Going out for a smaller bond allows us an opportunity to consider going out for an additional bond at a future date.
- There will likely be a statewide facilities bond measure on the ballot in June.
- Under the existing program IUSD must spend dollars to receive state reimbursement. This bond would increase our ability to be eligible for state reimbursement.
- Funds generated from the SFID stay local and are managed will be managed through a governing board.
 - o Directly benefit the schools and the home owners; well-maintained schools increase property values
- PTAs and unions will be the drivers for the SFID
