ASP & ABP Requirements

► California *Education Code* (*EC*) Section 56205 requires the submission of Annual Budget and Service Plans that are adopted at public hearings held by the special education local plan area (SELPA). These plans must identify expected expenditures and include a description of services, the physical location of the services, and must demonstrate that all individuals with exceptional needs have access to services and instruction appropriate to meet their needs as specified in their individualized education program.

CASEMIS Service Descriptors

- Multiple fields of information are pulled from IEPs for reporting purposes - including descriptions of services
- ▶ 200 codes = infants & toddlers/Part C
- ▶ 300 codes = specialized instruction
- ► 400 codes = related services
- ► 500 codes = psychological services
- ► 600 + 700 codes = low incidence services
- ▶ 800 codes = transition services
- ▶ 900 = OTHER

- Budgets adopted by each district
- Reported on a SELPA-wide basis
- Program funding
- Administrative costs
- Severe disabilities and low incidence disabilities
- Non-severe disabilities
- Supplemental aids & services in general education
- ► Regionalized services & program specialists

Funding Sources:

Federal Grants

- ► Local Assistance, Preschool, Staff Development, Part C
- ▶ Based upon December 1 pupil count from prior year

State Funds

- Based upon Average Daily Attendance
- General education total pupil count
- Adjusted during the fiscal year
- Out of Home funding based on address
- Mental Health allocation

<u>Local Contribution</u>

From districts' general funds

In California, local school districts are the primary resource for funding special education programs and services. In 15-16, school districts on average funded 61.8% of the costs, while the state funded 29% and the federal government funded only 9.2%. The percentage of the school district contribution has grown every year. Salary increases over the last few years for both certificated and classified staff is the largest contributor to this increase.
